Dear IWC Members,

After 21 years as a member and 8 years as president of this club, I am happy to leave the position in the capable hands of Tricia Conklin.

When I joined the club in 2004, it was very small. Most of us could sit around two big tables to eat dinner after the Saturday conformation shows (yes, "shows" - we had one show in the morning and another in the afternoon) and discuss club business. In the intervening years, the club has grown!

In 2011 there were 52 members. In 2017 when I became president there were 134 members. Today there are 310!

In 2018 the board decided to incorporate as a 501(c)(7) corporation. It was a complicated project. We were guided through it by a team of professionals, and our application was successful. The club officially became International Windsprite Club, Inc.

Under this aegis, new breeders have been mentored, and many more litters of puppies have been bred. Windsprite members are to be found in 35 US states, in Canada, and in 11 European countries.

It's been an honor being your president and I look forward to supporting the new officers over the next two years as new structures and modalities are put in place to support the growth of our club.



Part 1: Creepy Crawlies Beware!

Parasiticide? Just the sound of the word can be scary and intimidating! How do they work? And how safe are they for us and for our pets?

These substances target parasites in an attempt to prevent the transmission of various bug-borne diseases. Most paraciticides indended to kill external parasites function by exploiting the differences between mammalian and insect nervous systems in order to incapacitate the insect while keeping the pet or person safe. Without functioning nervous systems, the parasites are effectively paralyzed and killed.


The Most Common Paraciticides on the US Market

Ilsoxazolines

These are one of the darlings of the veterinary parasiticide world, and for good reason. While FDA approved for fleas and ticks, some of these drugs are highly effective against a variety of mite species (including mange mites) with fewer side effects than currently approved treatments. Because the speed of tick kill is so rapid, some of these products are also labeled for the prevention of Lyme disease.

These drugs work by interfering with the insect's neurotransmitter receptors. These medications are typically well-tolerated, but side effects can include GI signs (as with all oral medications) or skin irritation (with topical products). There is a low risk of neurologic signs (tremors, seizures) due to the possibility of the drug interacting with one mammalian receptor, although the medication is specifically designed to preferentially target several of the parasites' receptors.

Examples of drugs in this class include afoxolaner (Nexgard), sarolaner (Simparica), fluralaner (Bravecto), and lotilaner (Credelio). These medications may be given orally or topically, but both forms are systemically absorbed-parasites need to bite the dog in order to ingest the medication and die.



ANT FLASS

The flea life cycle can take as little as 14 days or as long as several months to complete. Most flea infestations involve multiple generations of fleas, which is why treating flea infestations requires addressing all stages of the life cycle, including eggs, larvae, pupae, and adults. Environmental control measures, such as vacuuming, washing bedding, and using flea insecticides, are essential for breaking the cycle and ridding your pets and your home of fleas once and for all!

Pyrethroids

These medications target a variety of parasites, killing fleas, ticks, mosquitoes, and some mites.

The original pyrethroid, pyrethrin, was originally isolated from some chrysanthemum species; Persian cultures used the flower extracts for thousands of years as naturally occurring insecticide! The molecule was modified to make longer-lasting parasiticide treatments used on both animals and humans.

The pyrethroids interfere with ion channels on parasite neurons. These compounds can also have an insect repellent effect. These topical medications are usually well tolerated, although skin irritation can occur. While not relevant for your Windsprite, this can affect some of your pup's furry housemates—some synthetic pyrethroids can be highly toxic to cats.

There are many pyrethroids on the market, often in combo products. Some examples include permethrin (Advantix) and flumethrin (Seresto collar).

Neonicotinoids

These popular flea and lice treatments artificially trigger nicotinic neurotransmitter receptors on the parasite's neurons. Most neonicotinoid products are topical, so skin irritation is the most common side effect, although pets that lick the medication can also have vomiting, drooling, or tremors.

Imidacloprid is by far the most popular in this drug class-Advantage, Seresto collars, and Advantix are the products most associated with imidacloprid. Less common drugs include nitenpyram (Capstar) and dinotefuran (Vectra).

Fipronil

The only commonly used medication in its drug class, fipronil is EPA labeled for fleas, ticks, and lice. The medication also works by blocking ion channels on parasite neurons.

Fipronil is one of the parasiticides that has been successfully tested in breeding and lactating dogs. Most side effects are limited to topical irritation, although some pet owners dislike the oily spot on the coat that can last for 1-3 days after application. The classic fipronil medication is Frontline.

Insect Growth Regulators

These drugs are not designed to kill the existing parasites; instead, they interfere with reproduction so the parasites eventually die out. There are multiple different types of these drugs, most often used in combo medications. Some IGRs include pyriproxyfen (Advantage) and lufenuron (Sentinel).



All things in life have pros and cons! Any microbial infection, parasite infestation, or administered medication can cause adverse effects on pets and people. However, these drugs have substantially decreased parasite-related suffering and death of pets and people worldwide. Your pet's lifestyle, life stage, and geographic location all affect what medication might be best for your dog. As always, your veterinarian is a great resource to make customized recommendations for your Windsprite!
