IWC BOARD ISSUES UPDATE TO CLUB BYLAWS

The Board of Directors of the International Windsprite Club met in December to address several matters requiring a discussion and vote on the part of the board members. Among the topics discussed were several amendments to the club's bylaws. The changes include adjustments to the timing and requirements surrounding board elections. Elections previously were scheduled to take place every other January.

Under the amended bylaws, elections will now take place in June. Additionally, the board added a requirement that anyone wishing to run for board election must be a member in good standing for a total of six years.

A NEW IWC HEALTH COMMITTEE HAS BEEN FORMED

A group of IWC members, including an experienced breeder, veterinarians, PhD biologist, dog trainer, and multiple up-and-coming Windsprite breeders, assembled and applied for the creation of a health committee within the International Windsprite Club. The committee was approved by the board this month.

The committee will serve in an advisory capacity to the board and the membership of the breed club. Recommendations may be made based on research conducted by the committee, peer-reviewed scientific research, and conferring with outside experts. The committee will maintain a strict policy of transparency regarding data collection and information sources. This committee will fill a growing need to manage the increasing volume of health and genetic information, as well as demonstrating to current and future members a commitment to building evidence-based policies around the health of the breed as its popularity increases.

Examples of committee responsibilities in pursuit of the aforementioned goal include:

- Gather and track data relevant to breed health and share it on an annual basis.
- Curate educational health and behavior resources for Windsprite owners and breeders.
- Determine best practices for creating and maintaining genetic diversity for optimal breed health as the population grows.
- Develop formal breeder recommendations to encourage best practices and protect breed health.


The IWC Health Committee will consult with experts in genetics, biology, canine theriogenology, veterinary medicine, canine behavior, and canine training when appropriate. Any club members with expertise in these areas are welcome to contact the committee at any time. The IWC Health Committee will meet quarterly on Zoom to discuss and collaborate on current committee goals. Subcommittees may meet more frequently as necessary. Minutes will be available to club members after meetings.

What is leptospirosis?

Leptospirosis is a bacterial disease recognized in a number of animal species worldwide. While many organs can be affected by leptospirosis, the most commonly affected organs in dogs are the liver and kidneys. Typical clinical signs can include vomiting, inappetence, abdominal pain, increased drinking and urination. In more severe cases, dogs may present with icterus (jaundice), absence of urine production, or hemoptysis (coughing up blood).

The prognosis for aggressively treated (hospitalized) dogs is variable. While some dogs make a full recovery, some will survive with lifelong alterations in organ function, some will not survive without dialysis, and some will succumb to the disease even with intensive treatment.

How does my dog (and how do I) get leptospirosis?

Rodents are considered the most likely source of most leptospirosis infections in dogs, but direct contact with rodents is not required for infection as the bacteria can survive and multiply in wet environments like puddles or even moist soil. Transmission directly between dogs has also been documented at dog daycares, boarding kennels, and shelters.

Leptospirosis is a zoonotic disease, meaning people can be infected, as well. Humans are usually infected from contaminated soil, water, or livestock. While dog-to-human transmission is rare, it has been documented.

What are the latest veterinary recommendations?

In October 2023, the American College of Veterinary Internal Medicine (ACVIM) released an updated Leptospirosis consensus statement. Twelve veterinarians, experts in nephrology, microbiology, epidemiology, and infectious diseases, reviewed currently available research—over 100 studies—and unanimously recommended that leptospirosis vaccines are administered to *all* dogs over the age of 12 weeks.

In 2024, both the World Small Animal Veterinary Association (WSAVA) and American Animal Hospital Association (AAHA) updated their vaccine recommendations to include leptospirosis vaccine as a "core" vaccine (along with rabies, distemper, adenovirus, and parvovirus vaccines). A core vaccine is one that is recommended to be administered to all dogs due to the ubiquitous nature of the virus and its ability to cause severe illness and death.

Why is there a perceived controversy among the pet-owning public around leptospirosis vaccines?

Leptospirosis vaccines have long been a main target of anti-vaccine folks. I suspect this is due to the less obvious nature of clinical disease making lepto seem less important (a frothing rabid animal or profusely vomiting parvo puppy is quite attention-getting) and the immunogenicity of historic leptospirosis vaccines. Without getting into too much detail, effective vaccines against bacteria (vs viruses) can be more complicated to create, and a vaccine may contain many various proteins associated with a bacterium.


Historic vaccines contained a larger number of different proteins; as vaccine technology progressed, the number of unique proteins within each vaccine decreased. A more recent study has shown that the risk of an adverse vaccine reaction from a leptospirosis vaccine is now similar to or lower than the risk of a rabies or parvovirus vaccine.

How Much Does Your Windsprite Weigh?



An informal poll was conducted on the Friends of the International Windsprite Club Facebook group to find out how much Windsprites weigh!

Over 225 dogs are represented in the results. Based on this poll, we can see that Windsprites rarely top more than 40 pounds. The only dogs reported to be over 40 pounds were male. No female Windsprites over 40 lbs were reported. Similarly, no male Windsprites under 20 lbs were reported. However, there were quite a few females under 20 pounds!

Most Windsprites seem to weigh between 20 and 35 pounds, with males slightly outweighing females across the board.
