## ANNOUNCING THE NEW IWC COMMUNICATIONS COMMITTEE

## <u>The</u> <u>Trouble</u> <u>vith Teens</u>

Puppyhood calms down and you start to feel like you've gotten into the swing of things when your puppy is around 6 months old. At that point (usually – but not always!) potty training is going well, training sessions are productive, and bad habits are being broken. Your furniture isn't a chew toy and you haven't had to order a bottle of enzyme cleaner in a while. Things are looking up. You're getting into a routine together and can ease up on your management.

And then suddenly one day they wake up and seem to choose defiance. All those bad habits are back, manners are forgotten, and new less than ideal behaviors pop up. You might find yourself asking – what happened? The answer is simple. Your sweet, innocent puppy is now hurdling face first into adolescence.

Not a puppy anymore, but not an adult either, adolescence is the most difficult developmental stage starting around 6-9 months of age and ending with maturity around 2.5-3 years of age. During the adolescent period your puppy is going through developmental leaps and bounds. We often hear that adolescents are pushing boundaries, claiming independence, or testing limits. The behavior of teens is often blamed on them, but there's much more to it than rebellion. In fact, there are a lot of reasons we see the behavior changes that we do in our adolescent dogs.

Hormones do play a part on driving teenage motive. Suddenly some smells become much more interesting and new feelings over territory may arise. Keep in mind, neutering or spaying does not remove All of the hormones produced in your dog's body. Their adrenal glands will still produce sex hormones. Genetic behaviors are also beginning to shine through. Herding breeds are far more keen on noticing environmental changes, Sighthounds drive after leaves blowing in the breeze, Terriers turn up the tenacity, and the list goes on.

As if hormones and genetic drive aren't enough, to top it all off, their brain has not yet finished maturing. They're undergoing some major remodeling and are basically wired to make bad choices. See, the brain matures from back to front. In the back of the brain you'll find the amygdala - the section of the brain responsible for emotion, impulses, and instincts. In the front is the frontal cortex - responsible for inhibition, planning, problem solving, and regulation. That means that the adolescent's amygdala is firing faster and more efficiently than the frontal cortex.

It's no wonder that teens seem to struggle with really big feelings and regulating or calming down from those big feelings. That day that your sweet puppy woke up and chose defiance, the day you wanted to rip all your hair out over their impulsive, emotional, irrational, and behaviors seemingly driven by big feelings? On that day their amygdala took the wheel. They're impulsive because they just can't help it - right now, they're wired to be.

Some days it feels like our adolescents have forgotten everything we've ever taught them. We ask for a behavior they've done a thousand times and they confidently do the wrong thing or look at us like we're speaking cat. Perhaps on these days their hippocampus – which is responsible for memory - is undergoing a remodel.

All hope is not lost though. The first step to navigating adolescence is understanding your dog's point of view. Understanding that every day their brain is a little different, everyday they're undergoing changes, and some days are just going to be more difficult than others for both of you. But we can help them through it.

Your most important job in supporting your adolescent dog is to be their frontal cortex. They cannot make a lot of good choices right now, so you'll need to hold their hand (or, paw?) and do it with them until they're better able to do it on their own. Work on skills out of difficult contexts, and then bring them into context when things are looking up in other areas. For our Windsprites, this often looks like going back to dragging or holding long lines and avoiding trails with heavy critter populations while you work on recalls and leave-its at home and in the yard. The biggest mistake we make with teen dogs is treating them like adults. Expecting them to be able to inhibit and make better choices, when they simply can't. In this way, we set them up for failure, and often, several chances to rehearse unwanted behavior.

So, drop your expectations. Walk away from those big training plans. Find your sense of humor. Be more forgiving. And most importantly, just enjoy your dog. Think of activities you can do in which the behaviors are easily manageable. Try some new things together. Work on building your relationship for a few weeks and then re-visit training. Most importantly, don't forget to have fun! Teenagers are really good at having a good time.
